A SPARKLING WONDERLAND

A few weeks ago, with heavy dew on the grass and the sun at just the right angle, the whole grassland, literally sparkled. What remained of the grass seeds were covered with tiny dewdrops turning the grassland that was already beyond its best, back into something spectacular.

Dew does much more than getting you wet when walking through the grass. It actually plays an important part in keeping our grassland healthy. Cool air cannot hold as much moisture as warmer air and when the grass becomes cooler than the air, the moisture in the cool night air condenses on the grass, just like steam from the shower does on the mirror in your bathroom.

Dew is not enough to replace rain, but it does benefit plants in three ways:

Dew prevents transpiration until it has evaporated, keeping more moisture in the plant and making it more resilient.

On hot days the evaporating dew keeps the plant cool and reduces heat stress.

Some desert plants can absorb the dew, relying on it as their source of moisture.

Road repairs – Olive Road and Lima Street.

The repair of the potholes in Olive Road is the initiative of the HOA of Sharonlea, Local residents have been contributing bags of asphalt to their access gate, and their HOA has provided a labourer, on Wednesdays and Thursdays, to fill the holes in their own roads and those in Olive Road. The chairman of the Sharonlea HOA has indicated that there will be contributions coming from those residents above President Fouche, so they intend to fill those very deep potholes all the way up to the corner before the school. Once again, they are dependent on donations from residents and can only progress if they have the bags of asphalt. ORV has donated 12 bags of asphalt to the cause with their commitment to also repair the potholes in Lima Street, but should there be any residents of ORV who would like to contribute, the cost per bag is R80 from a company called Robust in Muldersdrift. The cost of a

similar bag at Builders Warehouse is R160, so should you be willing to donate, please give your monetary donation to reception and we will purchase the bags of asphalt on your behalf.

Electricity Tariff Increase

Electricity tariff will increase by 11.32% from the 1st of July 2025

Administration

Residents must contact reception if they are no longer using a domestic worker or a private gardener, as we need to remove their access to the Village at the gate.

Residents are required to notify reception when relocating to another unit or moving out of the village, so we can update your file and other necessary systems.

If you are renting a carport or storeroom through reception, or if you have DSTV billed through the Olivedale account, you must complete a cancellation form. This form must be submitted to reception prior to your departure.

Payments at Reception

Reception does not accept cash, and residents cannot pay at reception with a meal card. The reception only accepts credit/debit cards as a form of payment.

No electricity can be purchased without a meter number. This can be done either with the Cash Power card, or the meter number can be written on a piece of paper; the alternative is to take a photo of the meter number and bring it to reception.

If you are planning to go away for a week or more, please complete a holiday form at reception. This is required for security purposes.

Safety

For your safety, please use the designated pedestrian gate when entering or exiting the premises.

Do not duck under or walk beneath the boom gates, as this poses a serious risk of injury and is unsafe. Some residents have injured themselves trying to go underneath.

Smart Dressing Tips:


Wear warm socks, gloves, and a hat. You lose a lot of heat through your head and hands!




