




BEETLE DRIVE– WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

I don't go to a gym. I have enough exercise jumping to conclusions, flying off the handle, throwing my toys out of the cot, running up bills, tilting at windmills and bending the rules.



It may be a bit late to wish everyone a happy and healthy 2026, but I send you my best wishes anyway. Summer has hit us with a bang and at the time of writing the temperature is around 30deg.C. The days are longer and the nights are pleasantly cool. The video that was sent by the office of the wetland was so beautiful that it makes me very sad that I am no longer physically able to go there. Such is life.

However, I had many good times in my life, and one great pleasure when I was in my teens and early 20's was going to what we called in those days the bioscope. The slang was the 'flicks', they were never called the movies in my neck of the woods. There were so many good films, from Westerns, to musicals, comedies, drama, you name it we had it. There was not the excessive violence we see today, and I can't help but think that what the young ones see on the screen is at times acted out in real life. On the screen are killings carried out with impunity and seldom any consequences. I believe that seeing this often enough will cause some people to carry it out in real life. They have perhaps become immune to killing and torture.

One of the Westerns I enjoyed was 'The Magnificent Seven', the original of course. The good guys were always on the side of justice and always came out winners. This was, however, rather violent for its time. I have never seen the sequel and do not wish too. I can only imagine the violence and foul language in the new version. Another film I enjoyed was 'Oceans Eleven'. There is a sequel to that too and I tried to watch it once but couldn't make head or tail of it. I remember the end of the first version when cash had

been hidden in a coffin, with the intention of robbing the grave later. The priest conducting the service said, very seriously, "The deceased will now be cremated" and all the ill-gotten gains went up in smoke.

I have never seen 'Love Story' but have heard how sad it is. However, I doubt it could beat 'Madam X' for being sad. I went to see it with my husband-to-be and my grandmother. As everyone walked out of the theatre one could see that almost everyone had been crying. All the women of course, but many of the men. Google it if you don't remember the film and the story. A real tear jerker.

Another film which I have never forgotten is 'Ship of Fools'. It was not a box office hit, but the memory of one line has stayed with me. The story is about a passenger ship sailing from Mexico to Germany in 1933. There was a mixed bag of nationalities on board, including some Jewish families returning to Europe. One of the passengers warned a Jewish father to leave Germany with his family because of the threat of Hitler. The Jewish man said "What will he do to us? There are over six million Jews in Europe. Is he going to kill us all?"

I loved the musicals of those days. Who can forget 'Seven Brides for Seven Brothers', 'Carousel', 'Annie get your Gun', 'Oklahoma' and others of that era, the songs from which I still enjoy today? 'West Side Story' was a different kind of musical but also so good. Many have dance routines, the like of which we don't see anymore, such as the dancing of Fred Astair and Ginger Rodgers, Gene Kelly, Cyd Charrise, Donald O'Connor, Rita Hayworth and others. Their dancing was so energetic that one felt quite

exhausted on their behalf. 'Singing in the rain' is another firm favourite that has been performed on stage too, as has 'The Sound of Music'. I could go on all day but perhaps this will bring back happy memories to you too, and you can remember times when you waltzed to this beautiful music. Many films and extracts from them are available on YouTube and some are free, so try it and bring back some happy memories.

Our sons were about 10 and 11 when SABC Tv screened a re-run of "The Student Prince". My husband and I were delighted and insisted that our sons watch it with us. Well, what a disappointment. It was so amateurish and dare I say corny, that the boys walked out after 10 minutes and we turned it off soon afterwards. So much for the wonderful films of our youth. On the other hand, not too long ago I saw 'Oklahoma' again and thoroughly enjoyed it. I didn't find it dated or not as good as more modern films.

THE BOTTLETOPS PROJECT

The Bottletops project was started in the Village several years ago and involves collecting the hard plastic screw-on bottle-tops which can be swapped for a wheelchair or other items according to the needs of the community collectors.

Early in January a small group gathered in the foyer of the Community Centre to mark a formal hand-over of a new wheelchair for the Village. This little group of residents included a few of our bottle-top collectors, two of the dedicated sorters (who have to throw out the many unwanted items of plastic in the collections) and Reinald Nel, our Village Operations manager, who has been most helpful and obliging in assisting with the delivery of the tops to the depot in Germiston, and Sister Marietta, who will keep the wheelchair as the property of ORV. It has taken three and a half years to collect the required weight of 500 kgs and we really appreciate the assistance of everyone who is involved in this project. It would not be even vaguely possible without the help from so many of the residents over several years.

ORV now has three wheelchairs from the Project all of which are available for use by any resident. The first two can be loaned, at NO charge, for six to eight weeks for a temporary need such as a joint replacement or sprains, a fall on the tiled floors and so on. This new third wheelchair is available for any resident, also at no charge, for a longer period to assist in that person's mobility or general comfort and ease in getting around the buildings. It remains the property of the Village and must be returned to the Village Sister or the Village management when no longer needed.

This project costs us nothing except our time and our interest but helps to keep some of the plastic out of our veld, helps to get the plastic to recycling works, and encourages a few who know little about recycling to copy the initiative. Please continue the wonderful assistance. It is very much appreciated and you can see the result and hopefully the appreciation of any users of the wheelchairs in the future.
